HOW DO YOU WALK?

Assurance of salvation is within the grasp of every individual Christian. While an attitude of selfexamination is certainly healthy (cf. 2 Cor 13:5), we also can and should be confident in our forgiven state. Paul, who called himself the "chief of all sinners" (1 Tim. 1:15), was still able to gratefully proclaim his innocence in the blood of Christ (1 Tim 1:16). The book of 1 John is all about having confidence in our salvation. John defines our confidence this way: "If we walk in the light, as He is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus Christ His Son cleanses us from all sin" (1 John 1:7). Our concern, then should be with what it means to "walk in the light." It is a walk in submissiveness John 7:16. It is a uniting walk. Psa. 133:1 and a cleansing walk. I John 1:7 "In Him we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of sins, according to the riches of His grace" (Eph. 1:7). Our need, then, is to have confidence in the cleansing power of Christ's blood! How grateful we should be that we serve a God who chooses to forgive and forget our iniquity (cf. Heb. 8:12)!

Psalm 46:10 simply says, "Be still, and know that I am God. I will be exalted among the nations. I will be exalted in the earth." Notice the comma after "be still". It means to stop, slow down, chill out. It is pretty obvious that the majority of us have allowed our culture to draw us into living extremely busy lives to the point that it is nearly impossible to focus our attention on what is really important. Consider the following:

1 Studies have shown that when we do two tasks at the same time we take about thirty percent of our attention off the primary task.2. Whenever two people meet in today's society, the odds say that one or the other will mention how busy they are.3. In 1950 we had on average ten activities to choose from, while today that number is over a thousand. Things become even more complicated because most of these activities are either fun or worthy of our time.4. The culture has convinced us that activity is all that counts and anything else is nothing more than laziness.5. God created both activity and rest. In fact, He commends both of them. So, to live within the bounds of His will requires a balance of both.

"SEARCH ME AND TRY ME"

Too many times we deceive ourselves regarding our own sins. For some reason, we don't tend to believe we're the ones the Bible is talking about when it says, "all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Rom. 3:23). It's relatively easy to study the Bible or listen to a class and think, "so-and-so needs to hear this!" But how much harder it is to allow God's word to rebuke and change us in our sins! God tells us to continually, "examine ourselves whether we be in the faith" (2 Cor. 13:5). What kinds of attitudes can help us to truly examine ourselves? How can we more easily recognize and let God help us deal with our sins? The Psalmist sincerely wanted to examine himself, so he prayed to God: "Search me, O God, and know my heart; try me and know my anxieties; and see if there is any wicked way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting" (Psalm 139:23-24). Talk about risky prayers! The person who prays like this had better be ready to deal with sin, because God will most certainly help us see what is lacking (cf. 1 John 5:14-15). We need to be able to honestly and frankly talk to God about our sin. We also need to be able to ask God to help us see our sin! When we have offended Him, there is no Biblical way to sugar-coat our behavior (Isa. 59:1-2). Risky prayers like the one the Psalmist prayed help us to look honestly at ourselves, and God answers prayers like that!
