DO YOU NURSE A GRUDGE?

How many of you remember the wedding of Prince Charles and Princess Diana in 1981. It was the grandest wedding maybe ever in history, with every head of state from every country in Europe, but one, in attendance. The one absentee was that of the King of Spain, Juan Carlos. He refused the invitation to the wedding of the century because of a grudge that dated back to 1704. Prince Charles and Diana would spend part of their honeymoon on the island of Gibraltar, which was seized by the British from the Spanish in 1704. This act committed almost 300 years earlier was still one the Spanish government held against the British government, and so the King was not going to the wedding. You would think two hundred and seventy-seven years would be long enough to forgive and forget. Forgiveness is something that sometimes does not come natural for us, but as Christians we are commanded to forgive. In Matt. 6:9-13, we find what many call the Lord's Prayer. Jesus instructs us to pray, "Forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors." In verses 14-15, Jesus instructs us, "If you forgive men their trespasses your heavenly Father will also forgive you. But if you do not forgive men their trespasses neither will your Father forgive your trespasses." Jesus tells us that in order for God to forgive us, we must forgive others that have wronged us. One example for us to follow is that of the father in the story of the prodigal son in Luke 15:11-31. The father of the prodigal son forgave his son's selfishness and accepted him back joyously. One example for us not to follow is that of the unforgiving servant in Matt. 18: 23-35. His master who was owed ten thousand talents forgave the servant. After he was forgiven, he refused to forgive a man who owed him only little. These two parables along with the verses in Matthew teach us that God expects His servants to be forgiving people. We should be happy to forgive, as we have all had the joy of God forgiving us. As Jesus said, he who is without sin among you, throw the first stone. Maybe you hold a grudge in your heart toward someone. Isn't it time to let go of it. I am truly delighted that God does not hold a grudge against us when we sin and ask forgiveness. It is time to let go. DAN
